

January-September 2024


Lighthouse short-term rental accommodation statistics for January-September 2024 indicate that NI self-catering occupancy is marginally behind 2023, impacted by an increase in the number of self-catering properties available this year compared to 2023. Year-to-date reserved nights has increased by 15% and Year-to-date ADR has seen growth of 8%. Average length of stay for those booking self-catering accommodation has declined slightly vs the same period in 2023.






September 2024

Lighthouse short-term rental accommodation statistics for September 2024 indicate that monthly occupancy in self-catering accommodation was 51%, down slightly on levels seen last year. Reserved nights experienced growth of 8% and ADR increased slightly compared to September 2023. Comparing performance in September against last month (August 2024), as is common around this time of year, occupancy has fallen by 18-percentage points and reserved nights have declined by over one-quarter. ADR remains on par with last month.

Notes:

- Lighthouse is a commercial travel and hospitality data platform specialising in real-time short term rental accommodation data, derived from listings on Airbnb, Booking.com, Vrbo and Tripadvisor.
- Analysis presented in this report relates to Tourism Northern Ireland's definition of 'Self-Catering Accommodation', defined as "a self-contained apartment, house, cottage, etc. which provides furnished accommodation for visitors including sleeping, dining and lounge areas and full catering facilities."
- Based on this definition, shared and private rooms have been excluded from the analysis and therefore this data should only be used as an indication of the self-catering sector's performance.
- If comparing this data against other self-catering accommodation performance sources, differing methodologies should be considered.
